Conservation Commission Plan to Control Invasive Plants Along Our Roadways

The Richmond Conservation Commission has a treatment plan to control invasive plants along the roads in Richmond. Come to their next meeting on Thursday, August 4 at 7 pm at the Veteran's Hall to learn more.

Invasive plants are non-native species that spread aggressively into an area, outcompeting the native plants and other non-invasive introduced species. They create a monoculture that negatively impacts farmland, forest health, and local waterways. More than thirty species are currently on the New Hampshire Prohibited Invasive Species List, including ones such as buckthorn, Japanese knotweed, garlic mustard, and oriental bittersweet.

The most effective control of invasive plants lies in early detection and removal.

The Conservation Commission has identified fortyeight sites along our roadways that are home to an invasive species, noting the GPS coordinates of each site. They plan a targeted application of glyphosate, trade name Rodeo (similar to Round-Up), hand-spraying the specific invasive species that they have identified in the public right of way along the town and state roads.

The Commission is doing this at its own expense, with donated labor and purchasing the herbicide with Commission funds. They will obtain all necessary permits and the work will be done by Commission members that are licensed to apply the herbicide.

We will announce in advance when the spraying will take place and encourage everyone to come to the Conservation Commission meeting on August 4 at 7 pm at the Vet's Hall to learn more and voice any concerns. Other towns in the region have conducted similar treatment plans to control invasive species.

The Meeting began at 5:25.

Last year's minutes have been approved.

Deb gave the Treasurer's report stating unfortunately, *The Rooster* took a loss. As of July 4, 2016 the checking account balance is \$551.46. The balance at the beginning of this year was \$620.01. Marie made a motion to accept the Treasurer's report with Jeani as second. All voted in favor.

Next on the agenda was the nominating and voting process. Jeani Eismont was nominated for a 3 year position on the Board, all voted in favor. Kathy McWhirk was nominated for a 3 year position on the Board, all voted in favor.

John reported that Carol is looking into turning *The Rooster* into a Charitable Trust. There is an annual fee of \$25 for that.

John read the "Conflict of Interest" policy which is Section 10-1 in the By-laws. There was some discussion clarifying just what that meant. Jeani made a motion to accept the policy as written, Terri as second. All in favor.

There was much discussion about bringing *The Rooster* back into print. It would also stay online (since 2006/7). The problem has always been retaining a dedicated advertising person, someone who knows how to sell! Debated about the merits of paying an ad person. However, *The Rooster* has always taken pride in being strictly volunteer. The cost of ads was discussed, print vs online, yearly vs monthly. Possibly send a letter to the local town businesses asking for their support.

Marie offered to write an article asking for and explaining the need for this vital position to be filled. It was suggested to do a monthly article about advertisers, reminiscent of the old "Meet Your Advertisers" articles written by Bonnie McCarthy. Would also need a disbursement person should we go back to monthly mailings.

The ad position could possibly become a two person job. Peter Mulhall volunteered to be bookkeeper for whoever would take on the position of selling ads. He feels he could take on organizing the advertising but is not a sales person. His keeping track of ads and billing would lighten the load for the ad seller. The Board felt this is something that could work.

Rosti talked about the history of *The Rooster* and the original town newsletter, which came out only a few times a year.

Rosti and John discussed the difference between print and online, how to make transition for both. Jeani and John talked about changing the web design. Also how to check on how many people go to the website for EACH issue as opposed to how many people just go to the website itself.

We agreed the meeting was at an end, Terri made a motion to adjourn, with Deb as second. All in favor. 6:35 pm.

State Primary Election

The NH State Primary Election will be held on September 13, 2016, at the Veteran's Hall from 8:00 am to 7:00 pm. People who are not yet registered to vote may:

- complete voter registration forms at the Town Clerk's office up until September 1,
- \bullet register to vote at the Supervisors of the Checklist meeting on September 6 from 7:00-7:30 pm at the Veterans Hall,
- or register to vote on the day of the election during polling hours at the Veteran's Hall.

For those who will not be able to come to the polls on September 13, absentee ballots will be available to those qualified to receive them. All requests for absentee ballots must be in writing and signed by the voter. Request forms are available at the Town Clerk's office, on the Town's website and at the NH Secretary of State's website, http://sos.nh.gov/. Go to "Elections

Division," click on "Election Forms," and click on "Absentee Ballot Applications – State Elections 2016."

The absentee ballot can be personally returned by the voter to the Town Clerk's office no later than September 12. If the absentee ballot is mailed back, it must be received no later than 5:00 pm on September 13. The absentee ballot may also be delivered by one of the following individuals: spouse; parent; child; sibling. If one of these qualifying individuals delivers the ballot, he/she must hand it directly to the town clerk or deputy town clerk. This person may not leave the ballot on a counter or in any mail receptacle. In addition, this person should bring his/her government-issued photo ID.

If you would like to know your status as a registered voter in Richmond, your party affiliation, or the status of your absentee ballot, you can view this information at http://sos.nh.gov/. Click on "Voter Information Lookup" located in the upper right hand corner of the screen and follow the instructions.

June Update

Jim McConnell – State Representative Cheshire 12 – Richmond & Swanzey

The legislature is essentially shut down for the summer. Committees conducting Interim Studies will begin meeting in September, including a House Ways & Means Committee Subcommittee to study the question of prohibiting New Hampshire residents from paying for the construction of high pressure gas pipelines. I will take every opportunity to work with the Subcommittee to convince them that New Hampshire electric ratepayers should not be forced to fund private pipeline companies' unjustifiable projects.

The early window for sitting legislators running for reelection to submit Legislative Service Requests (LSRs), which are requests to draft legislation for introduction in the next session, is September 12th through September 23rd. After the election there is an opportunity to submit additional LSRs, but I'd like to get my LSRs in as soon as possible and, assuming I'm reelected, avoid having to compete for attorneys' time with newly elected legislators.

After eighteen months of meetings, field trips and

studies, the Maplewood Subcommittee, charged with recommending how the county should address changes, if any, to the county nursing home, will vote on our recommendation to the Executive Committee – on which I also sit – which will then make a recommendation to the full County delegation. I strongly believe that Maplewood should continue to meet the needs of the county's medically neediest residents; those who are simply unprofitable for a private nursing home and have nowhere else to go. At the recent Maplewood hearing in Keene, for example, we heard from a man whose brother was turned down by seven different nursing homes before going to Maplewood. This, it seems to me, is the population that the County Nursing Home should serve. Asking the taxpayers to fund a nursing home to compete with private nursing homes is not an appropriate use of taxpayers' funds.



What To Know About Household Hazardous Waste & Recycling

ALLOWED

- Products marked poison, corrosive, caustic, toxic irritant, hazardous, flammable, combustible, and/or oxidizer are dangerous. If you are not sure, bring item to the next household hazardous waste collection.
- Mercury containing products:
- · Compact fluorescent light bulbs
- Thermostats
- Thermometers
- · Mercury button cell batteries
- Switches and relays

NOT ALLOWED

- · Empty HHW containers
- Latex paint Dry out and dispose of with your trash
- Make up and toiletries Dispose of with your trash
- Fire works Bring to the Keene Fire Department for disposal
- Gun powder Bring to the State Police for disposal

Keene Police Department Medication Disposal Dropbox

The medication drop box is located in the lobby of the Keene Police Department and is available for use to the public 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

Pharmaceuticals may be disposed of in the original containers or in a sealed plastic bag, Liquids must remain in the original container.

ACCEPTED:

- Prescription medication (Controlled and Non-Controlled)
- · Over-the-counter (OTC) medication
- Vitamins
- · Syrups, ointments, creams, lotions

NOT ACCEPTED:

- Needles, syringes, or lancets
- Thermometers, batteries or other products which contain mercury or cadmium
- Medical waste items such as IV bags, used bandages, gowns, or bio hazardous items
- Aerosol cans
- · Hydrogen peroxide or other disinfectants
- Personal care products (non-medicated

Household Hazardous Waste Facts

Flammable or reactive household chemicals can release toxic fumes or even explode if thrown in the trash, causing fires or injuries.

Dumping solvents into septic systems or landfills can contaminate ground and surface waters, ruining drinking water and killing fish and wildlife.

Pesticides can damage sewage treatment plants; oil poured into storm drains can flow directly into streams and ponds.

The best way to dispose of household hazardous waste is not to make it in the first place. Opt for safer, alternative products when purchasing materials that could become household hazardous waste.

Household hazardous waste collection is held from March through October. Check local newspapers and the City of Keene website for more information.

There is a limit per resident, per collection day of 10 gallons.

The average household throws 15.5 pounds of hazardous materials into the trash each year. Household hazardous materials are disposed of in other ways, too. Certain products, such as used oil, are sometimes poured down storm drains and many products end up going down the sink drain into septic systems or sewers.

Flammable or reactive household chemicals can

release toxic fumes or even explode if they are mixed together in the trash, causing fires or injuries. Dumping solvents into septic systems or landfills may contaminate ground and surface waters, ruining drinking water, killing fish and wildlife. Pesticides can damage sewage treatment plants and oil poured into storm drains can flow directly into streams and ponds.


