#### Thank You to our Volunteers

There are so many volunteers who do so much for our town. It is difficult to single out one or two. The Cemetery Trustees are constantly working to improve our cemeteries. Jerry Mills and John Lewis of the Richmond Historical Society have taken on improvements to the Quaker Cemetery. Roy Heise asked if he could mow Four Corners for us, and Sandy Laughner did the same for the Tramp House lawn. Bob Weekes has mowed the library countless times. Our volunteers pick up trash on the roads. Parks and Rec Commissioners, and Agricultural Commissioners, plan programs for our children and townspeople to enjoy the recreational opportunities in town. Volunteers run the Planning Board and the Zoning Board of Adjustment. Volunteers help in the Library and in archiving material for the Town archives. All these people – and countless more – helping to make our town run smoothly. The Rooster staff are all volunteers. Our thanks to all of you. #### **Budget Season In Full Swing**

It is that time of year again – town departments and commissions must calculate their budget needs for 2018, and any capital improvement projects. Budgets and CIP plans are due for November 6, 2017. The heads meet with the Select board throughout November, then the Select board puts together the town budget for presentation to the voters first, in a very important pre-warrant Budget Hearing early in 2018. Then it is presented for town vote at the annual March town meeting. More to follow on this process in the next few months.

#### Sale of Town Owned Land

We put several town owned properties up for bid, but received no offers on any of them – Map 202, Lot 35; Map 408, Lot 19; Map 409, Lot 40. We will put these properties up for bid again at a later time, when we put

other properties up too, to save on advertising costs. All offers to bid are advertised in local papers and on the town website. Minimum bids are typically set at half of the market value of the property. If you are interested in receiving special notice of these sales, please contact the Selectmen's office.

#### **County Tax Bill**

Richmond received the county tax bill for \$344,822 due in December compared to last year's bill of \$343,251. The town applies for a short-term tax anticipation note every year, in order to be sure we are able to pay the county tax by the due date, since our town taxes are typically due a few days or weeks after the county tax bill must be paid by the town.

#### September 2017 Update

Jim McConnell – State Representative Cheshire 12 – Richmond and Swanzey

The House this past month has been busy submitting Legislative Service Requests which drafting attorneys will turn into bills to be considered in January.

This year I have submitted nine bills, one House Resolution and one Concurrent Resolution, all of which I have listed and briefly described below.

# LSR 18-2066 requiring meetings and sessions of committees of the House of Representatives to be recorded and made available on the internet.

Requires live streaming and digital recording, enabling internet access, of all House Committee hearings, work sessions, executive sessions, committees of conference and any other meetings scheduled in the House Calendar.

LSR 18-2967.1 relative to physical force in defense of a person. RSA 627:4 II (c) allows for the use of lethal force to prevent a kidnapping or sexual assault. This LSR makes explicit the assumption that deadly force also applies to anyone aiding or abetting the kidnapper or perpetrator of the sexual assault.

This LSR is prompted by incidents in Europe where groups of men have formed a circle around a woman and denied anyone access to her to prevent one of their confederates from proceeding to rape her.

LSR 18-2068 making appropriations for costs involved in controlling invasive aquatic species. Seeks appropriation of \$19.5 million dollars over the next five years to roll back invasive aquatic species. Less the \$6 million we currently spend to attempt to stay even, this is a net \$13.5 million dollar increase over the next five years. This LSR seeks only \$5 million for each of fiscal years 2018 and 2019 as no legislature can bind future

legislatures. The next legislature will be asked to fund years three and four of the cleanup and the legislature after that the final year.

LSR 18-2069 establishing an executive order registry. Requires the Governor to post Executive Orders to an Executive Order Registry on the Governor's web site within seventy-two hours of signing. This is a change from what I described last month as I originally sought to have the Secretary of State maintain it. The Secretary of State will maintain the archives of Executive Orders but the Governors office will post them to their web site where they will be maintained until the Governor leaves office and turns them over to the Secretary of State.

LSR 18-2070 adding a 50 percent charge to all amounts assessed to persons liable for costs of containment, cleanup, and remediation of water and air pollution. Companies, to which this also applies, have come to New Hampshire because other states have more stringent environmental requirements than we do. This encourages them to take environmentally damaging businesses elsewhere. Soil pollution is also included in the remediation requirement.

# LSR 18-2389 requiring a report on state government commitments and contingent liabilities.

Requires the state to produce a Commitments and Contingent Liabilities Statement annually for each of the succeeding five years. This is a first, but very important, step to bringing clarity to our currently very opaque budget process.

LSR 18-2443 relative to EMT certification for veterans and military medics. Permits Medics and Corpsmen who have completed armed forces training and, in some cases, have combat experience, to have their military training and experience count towards their New Hampshire EMT certification.

LSR 18-2471 requiring sellers of real property to disclose certain information concerning environmental hazards. Self explanatory, but not yet finalized.

LSR 18-2565 House Resolution urging Congress to amend federal law on the issue of criminal liability for providers and users of computer services carrying advertisements offering sex with sex trafficking victims. Self explanatory.

LSR 18-2587 House Concurrent Resolution that the New Hampshire House and Senate reject hate, bigotry and violence in all their forms. Self explanatory.

LSR 18-2588 the permissible level of methyl tertiary butyl ether in drinking water. Reduces the permissible level of MTBE in drinking water to .5 parts per billion.

I'm sorry to say that the House Environment & Agriculture Committee recommended that **HB 399**, my bill dealing with pesticides where children play, received an Inexpedient to Legislate recommendation. The bill will come to the floor, and I may choose to argue the case further on the floor if there is a chance I can get their recommendation reversed.

Finally the Speaker of the House, Shawn Jasper, has accepted the Governor's nomination to become Commissioner of Agriculture. Assuming his nomination is confirmed by the Executive Council, I am a candidate — in a multi-candidate race — to replace him.

I have been recommending this Spell Check/Grammar software called *Grammarly* – I use the free version, and for most cases that should be adequate. To be honest, having never used the paid version, you may find paying for it is justifiable. Anyway, when you go to their site, it even provides a demo. Sister Scholastics taught me well on grammar, and therefore, I don't always agree with the changes *Grammarly* recommends, but she couldn't drill spelling into my head. By the way, Grammarly does not work with my "Word" (I use Open Office) software, but you can copy your document to an email or Google Doc, etc. to run it.

3. I started my 11th year of America Reads October 4th with Ms. FitzGerald – working with the kids is very rewarding.
